## Platooning. Looping. What's happening in 5th and 6th grades next year?



Team teaching is not new at Saint Joseph Catholic School. Each homeroom teacher in a grade level assumes responsibility for instruction of particular subjects. Next year, however, the platooning model or departmentalization will be fully embraced in fifth and sixth grades. A team of five instructors—each specializing in a different subject area—will work with students in the upper grades to prepare them for the move to middle school. The new departmental structure will be complemented by a looping model, where students have the same teacher in a subject area for two years.

While Saint Joseph's students are well prepared academically when they move to middle school, one of the things Principal Donavan Yarnall heard frequently was that they wished they had had more experiencing negotiating the demands of different teachers. The platooning model is designed to provide students with this broader range of experience while allowing teachers to become specialists in particular subject areas.

Returning faculty—Mike Harmon (English Language Arts), Vicki McNally (Religion), and Phyllis Brandis (Social Studies)—will be joined by two new faculty members. Chris Bailey, a member of Saint Joseph's parish, father of two current Saint Joseph's students. and a National Board certified teacher in Science for Early Adolescents, will lead science instruction for both grades. Jude Barrineau, a 36-year veteran of middle grades instruction, will join the staff as the pre-algebra teacher. Each member of the team will also teach one math block.

Vicki McNally believes the new schedule will benefit students: "Studies show that achievement increases with this 'Platooning Schedule.'" The learning experience is enhanced by being "allowed to move around and not just sit in one classroom environment all day," she said.

Phyllis Brandis looks forward to next year's departmental structure because it will allow her to invest "more time in the subjects at hand and give those subjects and the children my very best."

Commenting on the looping structure, Mike Harmon noted, "Teachers will be able to make stronger connections with students since there will be a two-year period and can teach lessons that will build upon each other from year-to-year, diving deeper into various subject areas."

The new departmental model for upper grades at Saint Joseph's will be a winning scenario for students and teachers alike.



# Making the "Ah ha!" Happen

Scientific research shows growing evidence that learning is about making connections. Want to see how it works? Visit Saint Joseph's second grade class. Gone are the days when teachers just stand in the front of the class, have students read from their books, and expect them to learn. When you enter Mrs. Anderson's and Mrs. McLeod's rooms, you can watch the "ah ha" happen as students make the connection between what they learn in the classroom and real-life experiences—all through an innovative teaching technique that Anderson and McLeod call "purposeful planning."

The concept of purposeful planning is to creatively pair the Diocese's curricula with hands-on experiences both inside and outside the classroom that help the children not only understand their lessons, but remember them.

"Collaboration is the key," Mrs. Anderson says. "It's about making a personal, positive connection and creating an experience with each lesson," says McLeod. "When we learned about sentence construction, Mary King from WIS TV visited and talked about the importance of learning the basics of writing and how they are critical for the students' future success in the workforce. When we learned

about Native Americans, we took a field trip to the Catawba Indian Nation Reservation where the children saw first-hand what they read about in their books. Those connections are what make learning fun and long-lasting."

Both teachers agree that second grade is a critical year for spiritual formation and academic growth. Their inclusive programming creates an environment where they work hard to foster the concept of a healthy, whole child who will hopefully grow into an adult who is a life-long learner.

Anderson and McLeod fill the year with hands-on experiences for their students. But how do these teachers afford visits to the Challenger Learning Center, trips to the SC Aquarium in Charleston, performances at the Koger Center, and much more? Careful research, good planning, generous families, grants, and connections in the community. "It's all about making those connections!" laugh both Anderson and McLeod. Just another example of how these two teachers who have taught together for so long they not only finish each other's sentences but also create a seamless and fun learning environment for second graders.
